Voter Registration Information

To vote in an election you must be registered (or change your party affiliation) at **least 29 days** before the election.

To register to vote:

- ★ **Online:** visit www.WakullaVotes.gov
- ★ **In Person:** Obtain an application from the Supervisor of Elections Office.

Where To Vote

Your polling location (precinct) is listed on your **Voter Information Card** or may be obtained through our website at: www.WakullaVotes.gov.

Polling Places

Early Voting – two locations. You may vote either location- no precinct restrictions.

Election Day – Polling locations (precincts) are open at 7:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m.

You **must** vote in your designated precinct.

Photo and Signature I.D.

You are required to present photo and signature I.D. before voting.

If you do not have photo and signature I.D., you will be able to vote by the provisional process. Your Voter Information Card is **not** acceptable I.D. for voting purposes.

Approved Identification

- ★ Florida Driver's License.
- ★ Florida I.D. card issued by the DHSMV.
- ★ U.S. Passport.
- ★ Debit or Credit Card.
- ★ Military I.D.
- ★ Student I.D.
- ★ Retirement Center I.D.
- ★ Neighborhood Association I.D.
- ★ Public Assistance I.D.
- ★ Veteran Health I.D.
- ★ Concealed Weapon or Firearm license
- ★ Government Employee I.D. issued by any branch, department, agency, of the Federal, State, County, or Municipality.

NOTE: If the picture identification does not contain the signature of the elector, an additional identification that provides the elector's signature shall be required.

Voter's Bill of Rights

F.S. 101.031(2)

Each registered voter in this state has the right to:

1. Vote and have his or her vote accurately counted.
2. Cast a vote if he or she is in line at the official closing of the polls in that county.
3. Ask for and receive assistance in voting.
4. Receive up to two replacement ballots if he or she makes a mistake prior to the ballot being cast.
5. An explanation if his or her registration or identity is in question.
6. If his or her registration or identity is in question, cast a provisional ballot.
7. Written instructions to use when voting, and, upon request, oral instructions in voting from elections officers.
8. Vote free from coercion or intimidation by elections officers or any other person.
9. Vote on a voting system that is in working condition and that will allow votes to be accurately cast.

Who Can Register

- ★ A citizen of the United States of America.
- ★ A resident of Florida and of the county where you intend to vote.
- ★ Be at least 18 years old (you may pre-register at 16 but must be 18 to vote).
- ★ Not have been adjudicated mentally incapacitated with respect to voting, unless that right has been restored.
- ★ Not have been a convicted felon. Unless your right to vote has been restored.

Ways to Vote

A registered voter can choose any one of the following three methods to cast their vote:

- ★ Voting by Mail
- ★ Early Voting
- ★ Voting on Election Day

Voting by Mail

If you need a Vote-By-Mail (VBM) ballot for the 2026 Elections, you must submit a **new** Vote-By-Mail request.

How to request the VBM ballot:

VBM requests must include name, date of birth, signature, ballot address, FL driver's license number or FL ID number, or the last four digits of your Social Security number.

Early Voting

- ★ Early Voting is held during the two weeks prior to each Election.
- ★ You will need to bring a valid photo and signature ID with you.
- ★ There are two **Early Vote** sites in Wakulla County. During Early Voting a voter may vote at either site.

Voting on Election Day

- ★ You must vote at your assigned precinct.
- ★ The polls are open from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.
- ★ You will need to bring a valid photo and signature ID.

How to Vote

Each precinct will consist of one Ballot Tabulation System (DS300) and one Ballot Marking Device (ExpressVote), accessibility for all voters as needed. Instructions on how to use the voting system will be available at all polling locations.

Ballot Tabulation System (DS300)

After the ballot is marked, the voter feeds paper ballot into the DS300 ballot tabulation system, which reads and counts the ballot.

How to correctly mark the ballot.

Use **black** ink only and completely fill in the oval next to your choice.



Do not use check marks, X's or cross out oval.



Accessible Voting System

Touchscreen technology that produces a paper-based record for tabulation.

- ★ Voter inserts unmarked ballot into ballot marking device.
- ★ Voter marks and verifies their selections.
- ★ Voter feeds paper ballot into ballot DS300 tabulation system.

Voter Responsibilities

F.S. 101.031(2)

Each registered voter in this state should:

1. Familiarize himself or herself with the candidates and issues.
2. Maintain with the office of the supervisor of elections a current address.
3. Know the location of his or her polling place and its hours of operation.
4. Bring proper identification to the polling station.
5. Familiarize himself or herself with the operation of the voting equipment in his or her precinct.
6. Treat precinct workers with courtesy.
7. Respect the privacy of other voters.
8. Report any problems or violations of election laws to the supervisor of elections.
9. Ask questions, if needed.
10. Make sure that his or her completed ballot is correct before leaving the polling station.

NOTE: Failure to perform any of these responsibilities does not prohibit a voter from voting.

Closed Primary

Florida is a closed primary state.

- ★ In the Primary Election, you will only vote for the candidates whose party affiliation is the same as yours and for nonpartisan races.
- ★ If a partisan race will be decided in the Primary Election, everyone will vote in that race. This is known as a "Universal Primary Contest."
